India aims to revive 'Cotton Route' to counter Chinese Silk Route

KOLKATA: Over the next three years, Indian researchers, including a maritime historian from Calcutta University, along with researchers from five other countries will try to trace the 2,000-year-old 'Cotton Route' that once existed between India and empires such as Rome and Egypt in Asia, Africa and Europe.

"Around 30 researchers from India and abroad, specialized in various fields — from history and economics to international relations and anthropology will carry out a study to trace the 'Cotton Route' and various aspects of these routes, including the cultural ties and trade

that India had with the world." Sachin Chaturvedi, director general of Research and nformation System (RIS) for Developing Countries, a Delhibased think tank of the ministry of external affairs, said. Experts from the RIS and a Kolkata-based organization, the Institute of Social and Cultural Studies (ISCS), will lead study. The project will be chiefly funded by the ministry of external affairs.

The Cotton Route Project was also discussed at length at an international conference attended by delegates from over 20 countries bordering the Indian Ocean.

With China planning to revive the ancient Silk Route — both over land and sea — experts feel India is out to counter the Chinese plan with the Cotton India's efforts to revive old ties with neighbors in the Indian form in the Indian Ocean Rim Association

gists have concrete evidence that reveals that huge bales of cotton were exported from India to Rome, Egypt and even to countries in Southeast Asia. In fact, they claim that Roman women could not even think of clothes, starting from apparel to home decors, without Indian cotton," SK Mohanty, a researcher at RIS, said.

Historically, the Silk Route was a key route between China and the Mediterranean that not only helped trade but formed a cultural bridge between China, India, Persia, Greece and Rome.

from stalagmite and stalactite caves on an island named Sacotra near Yemen and trade agreements written on papy rus that are still preserved in the Austrian Museum prove beyond doubt that cotton was exported in bulk from India," said Arindam Mukherjee of

Historians say superior quality cotton was produced in areas like Bengal and western India. Chinese texts dating back to 1226 have recorded evidence on this.

Researchers said it would be wrong to say there was one exclusive route for cotton known as Cotton Route. Indian cotton and the dve which used to last for centuries (as found in Berenice port) were so popular that several routes originating from India could be traced.

"Our task will be to trace all the 'Cotton Routes' dating back to the 1st Century AD to 12th Century AD period, by tracing and mapping the cotton plantations to dyer and weavers' communities and exploring the maritime trading route through which cotton was exported," the

"Another historian, Radhika Seshan, of Pune will focus on the period between 12th to 17th centuries," said Suchandra Ghosh of Calcutta University who specializes in ancient maritime trade.

She said Periplus of the Erythraean Sea had described some of the ancient navigation routes through which cotton was traded from India.

KOLKATA: The BJP state headquarters at Muralidhar Sen Lane turned into a battle zone for the second day as a clash broke out between party work-ers. BJP workers and district leaders continued to vent their anger on the state leadership over civic poll nominations including Kolkata Municipal Corporation. Workers also burnt the effigy of state president

Rahul Sinha in Topsia.
"Only three- to four-persons are our workers, the rest are outsiders who are trying to create chaos. Trinamool Congress controlled goons are trying to create trouble and are attacking us," said Sinha. "If this drama continues, will our workers sit idle? They had shown enough restraint," Sinha said when asked about his loyalists hitting out at protesters with bamboos and sticks.

Since Wednesday morning, workers from South 24 Parganas gathered in front of the party headquarters and started protesting. They had raised slogans against Sinha. The protesters alleged that district leaders are corrupt and the state president is harbouring such people. They also displayed posters and place
